Section 1

Why This Is Important

The final seven days before your wedding are emotionally heightened.

Excitement increases.

External input increases.

Questions increase.

Pressure increases.

Most final-week stress does not come from major problems.

It comes from small friction:

- Unclear responsibilities
- Unconfirmed timings
- Last-minute additions
- Emotional overload

This tool exists to protect the final week.

It is not about improving the wedding.

It is about stabilising it.

Calm is protected before the wedding day begins.

Section 2

How to Use This Tool

Start using this tool at the beginning of your final week.

Work through it deliberately and without rushing.

Confirm what must be confirmed.
Delegate what must be delegated.
Remove anything unnecessary.

This is not a planning tool.
It is a closing tool.

By the end of this process, there should be:

- No unresolved supplier questions
- No structural timeline changes pending
- No major decisions left open

The goal is closure.

Section 3

The No New Decisions Rule

In the final 7 days, avoid:

- Changing the overall timeline
- Adding new suppliers
- Introducing new formalities
- Rewriting speeches entirely
- Redesigning seating plans from scratch

Small refinements are acceptable.

Structural change creates instability.

Commit to the plan you have built.

Section 4

Confirm and Close

At the start of the final week, confirm:

- Final guest numbers
- Supplier arrival and setup times
- Who holds supplier contact details
- Final balances and payment arrangements
- Décor placement responsibility
- Music and announcement coordination

Once confirmed, close the discussion.

Repeated revisiting creates stress.

Section 5

Delegate Clearly

In the final week, you should step away from operational management.

Nominate:

- One calm point of contact for suppliers
- One person responsible for guest queries
- One person overseeing transport
- One person holding key documents

Clarity reduces interruption.

Interruption increases anxiety.

Section 6

Protect Personal Energy

The final week can become socially intense.

Protect yourself by:

- Limiting unnecessary commitments
- Reducing reactive messaging
- Setting boundaries around availability
- Scheduling quiet time
- Prioritising sleep

Energy matters more than micro-adjustments.

Section 7

Simplify Contingencies

In the final week, clarify fallback principles.

If something runs late — shorten, do not extend.

If weather shifts — adapt calmly.

If a supplier adjusts — communicate clearly.

Do not build complex emergency plans.

Simple principles protect atmosphere.

Section 8

48-Hour Calm

Two days before the wedding:

Stop adjusting.

No more structural edits.

No more timeline changes.

No new additions.

Pack calmly.

Lay out clothing.

Confirm transport.

Then step back.

Trust the preparation you have completed.

Section 9

Wedding Morning Mindset

On the morning of your wedding:

- Eat properly
- Hydrate
- Allow extra time
- Delegate immediately
- Avoid reactive phone use

You are not there to manage.

You are there to experience.

Section 10

Final Reflection

At the start of the final week, ask:

- Is everything confirmed?
- Is responsibility delegated?
- Have we stopped adding complexity?
- Are we protecting our energy?

If yes, calm is already in place.

A wedding that feels calm does not happen by accident.

It happens because the final week was protected.
